He also runs a winter junior golf program that involves up to 40 juniors at his club. Mike has had a student play in the last two (2002 and 2003) US Junior Championships. Mike is actively involved in several events benefiting various charities such as Make-a-Wish Foundation; First Tee; American Heart Association; brain cancer research in memory of Tommy Wine, PGA; and epilepsy research.
